To build a custom SAGrader assignment, we need three things from you:

- 1. A detailed grading rubric
- 2. 10 or more graded responses
- 3. Source text information

We'll need about two weeks to build your assignment.

Grading Rubric

Student Prompt:

Describe the assignment for students. This should be explicit enough to identify the key elements expected in a good question and should specify how many of each of those are required for full credit.

It may be a complex essay assignment, asking students to identify some key elements, then other features related to those, still other features related to those, and so on. Typically, questions can be expressed as an outline with the highest level items at the top, subordinate items under those, and on and on. A single assignment can be composed of a single question or several different questions.

Your description here may be more detailed than the prompt displayed to students. Sometimes, for example, you may want students to be able to identify the appropriate sub-elements required in the question without having to specify that for them.

Outline of potential correct answers:

Correct answers of varying types and their relationships to other items are summarized in outline form. This should reflect the key elements you would expect to see in correct answers.

For each sociologist, students should identify birth year, death year, birth country, 1 study written by the sociologist, 1 thing that influenced the sociologist, 1 theory associated with the sociologist and 1 item that made the sociologist significant or an important aspect about his or her life.

Students should also identify and define at least 1 concept related to the sociologist.
